This Service

All Souls' Day is an ancient Feast Day during which, we remember and pray for those who have died. In the early church, there were not always standard dates for things, but, by the 11th Century, All Souls', or the Commemoration of the Faithful Departed, had settled onto November 2nd. By the time of the Reformations in the sixteenth century, All Souls' Day had become a time to pray for those who had died, and whose souls were thought to be in Purgatory, which is a place of preparation for Heaven. This was one of the Roman Catholic Doctrines that was questioned, and removed from our Prayer Book. As a result, All Souls' Day disappeared for a while from the Church Calendar in the Anglican Church (of which our own Episcopal Church is a part). Big festivals would have been celebrated for a few days, as people came into the towns for markets and festivals. Hence, Oct 31st is Halloween, or All Saints' Eve, or All Hallow's Eve. November 1st is All Saints' Day, and on November 6th, today, we commemorate All Souls' Day. When All Souls' disappeared, All Saints' took on a dual aspect both of thanking God for the Saints and for remembering those "whom we love but see no longer." Over the years, folks felt All Souls' was an important day, in its own right. A chance to celebrate life, but also a day when the experience of death and bereavement could be explored in a quieter atmosphere than that of All Saints'.

This Requiem offers a chance for that reflection: a time to celebrate, and remember, and a time to come before God, as people who have suffered loss. This service gathers up all those feelings of gratitude and hope that we hold for heaven, but also those feelings of bewilderment, anger, and estrangement, which we feel when we face the loss of a loved one. This service is a place to be with God, a place to pray to God, and a place to seek God.

From the Director of Music

It is always an honor to sing this service, each year, for us. Since Covid, many of us have experienced great loss. Death is always among us, and is part of the cycle of life, as God intended it to be. Yet, as Christians, we believe in the Communion of Saints, which refers to the spiritual union of the members of the Christian Church, the living and the dead. We are all one mystical body, those on earth and those in heaven, with Christ as the head, in which each person contributes to the good of all, and shares in the welfare of all. Large works, such as Requiems, in today's world, are usually performed, as a whole, in a concert program. We are unique in that we use the sung portions of the Requiem which conjoin with our liturgy to honor those who have passed. Therefore, we will be singing the Requiem pieces in a slightly different order, from the written format, which helps to connect them within the context of our liturgy. Rutter's Requiem was written for his father, who had passed away, and so the pieces reflect a mirid of emotions, from grief to sorrow to peace and joy.

The Composer

In Rutter's own words: "I've known I wanted to be a musician ever since I could walk and talk. My bewildered parents, probably driven crazy by the hours of piano improvisation and piping treble singing they endured, sent me at age seven for piano lessons where my teacher told me to be a composer, or singer, not a pianist. A director of music at a boy's school pointed my footsteps in the direction of Cambridge University, where I met David Willcocks, who took an interest in my compositions, and recommended me to Oxford University Press, who signed me up while still a student." (johnrutter.com). John Rutter is one of the most well-known and beloved composers of choral music in the United States. Although he is British in origin his choral works have manifested across America, in various church denominations. His music has extremely high standards, yet it is very accessible. He is admired for his beautiful melodies, set in creative ways. Most of Rutter's choral works have been orchestrated in addition to the standard piano/organ accompaniments. Rutter considered a person of "genius" to have a unique ability to transform lives, and he likened the purity of music to that of mathematics and connected the two with a reference to the discovery made by the early Greeks that frequencies of harmonic pitches are related by whole-number ratios. About the Requiem

The Requiem was written in 1985 and first performed in October of that year. Following the precedent established by Brahms and Faure among others, it is not strictly a setting of the Requiem Mass as laid down in Catholic liturgy but instead is made up of a personal selection of texts, some taken from the Requiem Mass and some from the 1662 Book of Common Prayer. The seven sections of the work form an arch-like meditation on the themes of life and death: the first and last movements (*Requiem aeternam* and *Lux aeternam*) are prayers on behalf of all humanity, movements 2 and 3 (*Out of the deep* and *The Lord is my shepherd*) are psalms 3 and 5 (*Pie Jesu* and *Agnus Dei*) are personal prayers to Christ, and the central *Sanctus* is an affirmation of divine glory.
